Integration Maintenance

- Every integration is an operational contract neither vendor signed.
- When either side changes an API, someone on your team absorbs the repair.



Context-Switching Tax

- Every tool in the diagnostic path adds a reassembly tax.
- It doesn't look like a cost. It looks like a Tuesday.



Duplicate Capability

- Redundant tools aren't free insurance.
- They're redundant surface — twice the place a failure can start.



Governance & Security Surface

- Every tool is a new place credentials live.
- Zero technical integration still means zero governance coverage.

Five Tools, Zero Owners of the Combination



Every tool can have an owner. The system they create together doesn't have to.



What the Accounting Should Actually Measure

Integration Maintenance

Map which tools actually integrate — not which could.

Duplicate Capability

Audit by function, not tool name — two secrets managers don't show up alphabetically.

Context-Switching Tax

Pull it from incident postmortems: how many tools did the engineer correlate?

Governance Surface

Count systems that hold access — independent of technical integration.
